Welcome to English 10! In this class, you will embark upon a series of reading, writing, listening, speaking, and viewing tasks throughout the year. We will work together to meet or exceed the New York State Next Generation English Language Arts Learning Standards. Most importantly, you will learn the habits of good readers and writers, and you will have opportunities to put those habits into practice daily as we all develop as lifelong learners.

Course Objectives:

Upon completion of this course, students will:

- 1. Write in a variety of forms for various audiences and purposes.
- 2. Use conventions and mechanics of written English, including the rules of grammar and usage, to write clearly and effectively.
- 3. Acquire an extensive vocabulary through reading and targeted word study.
- 4. Read extensively and intensively for different purposes and using a variety of strategies.
- 5. Speak clearly and effectively for a variety of purposes and audiences.

Classroom Rules/Expectations:

- 1. Respect the school, the teacher, your classmates, and yourself:
 - a. Follow directions immediately the first time they are given
 - b. Treat all school property and materials with care.
